

NEW YORK, June 2 — When racist Governor George Wallace came here today to talk up segregation on NBC's "Meet the Press," more than 500 youthful Black and white pickets turned out shouting and chanting such slogans as—"Wallace is a criminal; why is he free?"



## 4th Amendment "Invalid"?

Governor George Wallace of Alabama said the other day that the 14th Amendment was "Constitutionally invalid" and therefore should be nullified.

Considering that the U.S. constitution was a slaveholders' Constitution before the 13th, 14th and 15th Amendments, and to a certain extent still is, the racist Governor has a legal point.

The 14th Amendment was passed in a way that wasn't quite according to the ideas of the Constitution-makers. Strictly speaking it wasn't "legal."

(Of course the American Revolution wasn't "legal" and the Civil War wasn't "legal" and the Civil War wasn't "legal," either. The existence of the United States, by this logic, is open to serious legal doubts!)

This tactic was only possible because a civil war had just been fought against the ruling class these men represented and an army was occupying their country.

The ruling class of today—including the now all-powerful Northern ruling class—conceals this irregularity from the schoolchildren and all but erases it from history.

Both Northern and Southern ruling classes conceal it—not because either is in the least bit serious about enforcing the 14th Amendment's mildly progressive provisions, but because they are both mortally afraid the oppressed masses will learn the most effective way to change constitutions in their own

Thomas Jefferson said, "The tree of liberty should be watered from time to time with the blood of tyrants."

Some of the so-called friends of Black Freedom have tried to re-word that injunction and water liberty with the blood of the tyrants' victims.

That, more or less, is how the moderates, liberals, pacifists, etc., view the struggle in the South today. The worst of them call for restraining the struggle altogether, telling the people not to march, not to demonstrate, etc. The best of them call for restraining the normal passions of people who are asking for freedom and being spit upon, kicked, beaten and tortured.

Some defend this line of action not as a way of life or a religious principle like the preachers do—but as a clever and successful tactic. "Doesn't it compel the attention of the whole world?" they say. "And doesn't it succeed in gaining concessions from Kennedy and the

But it is not the restraint of the oppressed that shocks the world, it's the lack of restraint of the oppressors! And it's not the non-violence of the sit-ins and the marchers that wins concessions from the racist. It's the fact that the sit-inners sat and the marchers marched!

Those who regard non-violence as a tactic in this epic struggle may believe that an attempt at self-defense will only bring more violence down upon the oppressed from the oppressor. But the facts prove otherwise.

William Moore, for example, was killed because he put his faith in love rather than struggle. The cowardly racists are encouraged in their violence, knowing in advance that their victims will be non-violent.

#### VS. Struggle

f The exponents of non-violence as a tactic may imagine that the racists will not kill unarmed demonstrators in broad daylight. But they underestimate the cruelty of the racists just as they underestimate the racists just as they underestimate the rising wrath of the people they are trying to lead. The racists are just as capable of slaughtering unarmed masses as they have already shown themselves capable of slaughtering unarmed individuals.

The great masses of Black people understand this very well and one of the big reasons they have not moved in much greater numbers onto the arena of battle is that they want to win—not just be martyrs. For them, the "philosophy" of non-violence never even existed. They do not want to be organized as sitting ducks; they want to be organized rized as an army of fighters to win their freedom.

#### **Baldwin Says Rev.** King

NEW YORK, May 28—Author James Baldwin said today that a great many followers of Martin Luther King are now turning their backs on him. Reason: non-violence won't work.

Baldwin spoke over New York educational station, WGBH-TV and strongly criticized Rev. King's philosophy of "love your enemies" and "turn the other cheek."

"You can only survive so many beatings, so much humiliation, so much despair, so many broken promises before something gives.
"... Martin has reached the end of his rope," he said.

#### Sobell Anniversary of Rosenbergs' Supporters t Rally at Death 10th

June 19 is the 10th anniversary of the martyrdom of Julius and Ethel Rosen-

The Rosenberg-Sobell case was a product of the witch-hunt hysteria of the McCarthy era. Despite nation and world-wide protests, Ethel and Julius Rosenberg were executed and Morton Sobell languishes in prison for the allleged crime of "ocnspiracy to commit" espion-

age. Neither actu were actually charged with espionage or treason. Under the "conspiracy" charge, no proof of any actual acts of espionage is needed. No proof was forth-

Not one shred of documentary evidence was presented at the trial. The chief witness against the Rosenbergs, David Greenglass, has since been called a habitual liar and mentally unbalanced by his wife.

Nobel prize scientist Harold Urey asserted that Greenglass did not have sufficient knowledge of physics, chemistry, or mathematics to transmit atom bomb

secrets to anyone.
The U.S. Court of Appeals said:
"Doubtless, if that (Greenglass's testimony) were disregarded, the conviction could not stand."

#### Fairy Tale and a Test Ban

Second only to the hypocrisy of the U.S. ruling class over Birmingham is its hypocrisy over nuclear testing.

In the past few weeks, Kennedy has suddenly become very concerned about the nuclear testing and told the people he was worried about "the genie getting out of the bottle"—as though he were talking to children at the Library's Saturday Afternoon Fairy Tale Reading.

(Last October, if memory serves, Kennedy said he would pull any number of genies out of the bottle and threatened not just a nuclear test or two but a nuclear war to obliterate half of mankind—including by some official estimates, 90 million of his own countrymen.)

Not only Kennedy, but the whole capitalist press and a great many Senators and other spokesmen for big business thave now sounded off very progressively indeed on the dangers in further nuclear testing.

But suddenly there comes an announcement that the Soviet Union is the likely to start nuclear tests again, thus rudely ignoring all these good Senators and trampling upon the honest anti-war sentiments of the idealist in the White House!

Only last month, the U.S. moved to widen the nuclear field to include several NATO countries, thus possibly tipping the military status quo against the Soviet Union so that a test-ban becomes more or less impossible.

And just last week, Moscow's discovery of a serious spy-plot raised the question of U.S. knowledge of important Soviet military secrets which would make the Soviet Union more vulnerable to attack by the war-mad imperialists. The Soviet Union may thus be compelled by U.S. pressures to test in the atmosphere at the very moment when U.S. propaganda says the U.S. is for a test ban.

The Soviets know very well they will have to test at the risk of losing the good will of a great many well-meaning people who do not understand the imperialist plotting or the imperialist

hypocrisy.

## Steel Union Fac More Layoffs

While the Steelworkers Union delays setting a possible strike deadline, the steel industry goes on with near capacity production piling up steel so that industry will not "suffer" if there is a strike. This of course considerably blunts the edge of the strike weapon and makes a longer strike necessary if there is to be one.

The word has gone out that the "Human Relations Committee" (a phony labor-management-"public" set-up forced on the steelworkers after the last strike) is negotiating the next agree-

An extended vacation period for older workers seems to be in the making—which is all very well for the individual workers who will benefit—but as a cure for unemployment, which it is supposed to be, it will be about as effective as a cat on a tin roof in a high wind.

Meanwhile, in the steel towns, the companies are trying to brainwash the workers and their families by telling them via radio, newspapers, etc.—that the whole trouble with the American steel industry is that the workers get too much money and do too little work. "Lower-paid German and Japanese workers are sweating every day to outproduce the U.S. workers," the radio says. The radio doesnt say that the United Steelworkers should donate money to the foreign workers' strike funds so they'll make as much money as U.S. workers.

The radio doesn't say that some of the biggest companies in the U.S. are building huge modern plants in Germany, Italy, Japan, Belgium and Holland so they can super-exploit foreign workers while they nonchalantly lay off

## Black Masses Say IS Alabama Angeles 507

EOS ANGELES, May 27—The largest city, with a crowd variously estimated at 30,000 to 50,000, roared its agreement when speakers said that Los Angeles' segregation must go just as Birmingham's must.

(Following the rally, about 800 people, marched downtown from Wrigley Field to City Hall—a distance of five miles—to demand justice in Los Angeles. Some carried signs saying, "L. A. is Alabama!")

Martin Luther King was the featured speaker, but the thunderous applause he got was not for his pacifism or "non-violence" but for his militant phrases and his constant insistence on "Freedom Now."

The whole demonstration was so powerful that the ruling class politicians had to support and indeed try to take it

Mayor Yorty—vacationing in fascist Spain—felt called upon to send a telegram of "support" to the rally. And Governor Brown wired that segregation must be abolished in Los Angeles or else situations like that in Birmingham

(Brown himself was picketed recently in Los Angeles with interracial pickets calling upon him for fair play in the Muslim frame-ups and similar cases.)

There were about 40 organizations sponsoring the rally, most of them labor unions and related bodies. Several auto workers' locals were very generous in their financial donations.

The great prominence given to Hollywood actors on the platform (something almost inevitable in any big gathering out here) was of course a drawing card, but it also watered down the real working class character of the audience and the down-to-earth militancy of the masses. Nevertheless, the affair was a milestone in this city and will mark the beginning of a higher stage in the civil.

# **Great Labor Solidarity**

SAN FRANCISCO—This city is only a quarter the size of Los Angeles, but about the same number of people turned out for "Human Rights Day" Parade. Police estimated the crowd at 30,000. This only counted the actual marchers and those who came to hear the speakers at City Hall.


About half the parade marchers were Black and half were white. An alliance of Afro-American preachers and labor leaders sponsored the parade.

The Central Labor Council officially backed the whole affair. Harry Bridges was one of the leading marchers in the parade. Labor's ranks turned out en masse. From top to bottom, it was the biggest display of Black and white solidarity ever seen, even recalling the general strike of 1934.

As in Los Angeles, the most conservative politicians made demagogic speeches about how it is necessary to fight for freedom. But this does not mean that these-fakers can put across their real morrow.

On the contrary, they are being forced into the position of saying a shaky "Me, too" as the Black masses and their allies prepare to shake the racist world.

Take the case, for example, of a Spanish-American recently admitted to Jacobi Hospital in New York. He was operated on for an arterial break and then put into the hospital dormitory. But then it was discovered that the dormitory space could be used for a white, "all-American" patient. So the Spanish-American patient was promptly removed and deposited in the hallway.

Now this incident leaked out in time and the hospital was compelled to return him to the dormitory.

Countless other incidents of callous discrimination against Spanish-American been reported only after the little thinning of mercy had brought disastrous consequences to these patients.

Undoubtedly there have been other cases where there were no eyewitnesses (surviving) present. Well, what the public doesn't know won't hurt the hospital management!

And don't think that Afro-Americans a

"treatment" for nothing. According to the New York Spanish-American daily La Noticia, Spanish-American patients have been given papers to sign authorizing operations much more expensive than those they need. Since these patients absent-mindedly forgot to go through medical school before getting sick or injured, many of them have signed the papers. In this way, Spanish-Americans pay more than "all-Americans' for the same operations, and these higher expenses are not covered by their insurance.

"After all," the hospital owners might say, "these Spanish-Americans and Afro-Americans should be glad to pay the extra money. We may not give them as much devotion or mercy, but we certainly give them lots more discrimina-tion."

"It's spring and the sap begins to run," indulgently said New Jersey Governor Hughes of last month's riot at Princeton University. The damage caused by this "spree" has been estimated at \$5,500. The students set fires, tore up fences, ripped screens off houses and threw cherry bombs. They sent a one-ton air compressor rolling down a road, endangering passing cars. The boys were "severely reprimanded." Fourteen were arrested and then released on \$25 bond each.

But what would have happened if workers' sons—Harlem kids—instead of rich college boys, did the same thing? It would be reform school, jail, and screaming headlines in the press about "Vicious Hoodlums" and "J.D.'s on the Rampage."

The shorter work-week (at the same pay as formerly), which the New York City electricians won last year, has created 800 to 1,000 new electrical jobs.

Theodore W. Kheel, director of the Office of Impartial Review of the New York City Electrical Industry, announced last week that this has happened despite a general decime in construction work.

The decline has hit the other building trades. But electrical workers have hard-ty been affected because of their 25-hour a work week.

The cholera epidemic, raging in India ever since January, is now believed to be the worst in this century.

This dread disease, which when untreated kills 90 per cent of its victims, is not carried by human contact, but by contaminated drinking water. Modern sanitation and health measures could banish cholera from India as they have shown in China.

But cholera still takes its yearly toll. The capitalist-created filth of India's teening cities, the starvation and disease of her villages grow worse year by year. Two hundred years' rule by Indian brought more widespread epidemics. And sixteen years' in the irony of it all is that many people leliminate it.

The irony of it all is that many people believe that "socialism" prevails in India!

Actually, the situation is just the opposite. While the Indian masses have become poorer, the Indian masses have become the Indian with it the 1947 withdrawal of British troops, has found new ways of sinking its talcoms deeper into India's misery.

An informative article in Peking Review (April 12) quotes from public reports by Indian politicians and businessmenen:

Peace To Govt. of India **Offers** China

PEKING, May 26—An editorial in Jenmin Jih Pao, official newspaper of the Chinese Communist Party, today held out an olive branch to India, but warned that continued Indian border provocations would not be endured by China.

Speaking of the Chinese release of all Indian prisoners (3,213 of them) as a gesture of peace, the editorial said this should prove China's "reluctance to cross swords with India."

But should India "create new border clashes," the editorial went on, "the Indian government will again be exposed rather than gain any advantage."

The Indian government, under the pressure of foreign imperialism and the reactionary capitalists of India itself, is demanding that China move back to the border positions of September 8, 1962, before the autumn conflict erupted.

The Chinese are willing to resume the border positions of three years earlier while talks proceed. (The Indians had been encroaching on Chinese territory during that time and therefore by September 8, 1962, occupied parts of China while they had not occupied before.)

Meantime, India is asking for \$1,500,000,000,000 in military assistance from the United States and Britain "to meet the threat from Communist China," according to the May 21 New York Times.

The imperialists are of course only too anxious to "help" India to carry out imperialist policy with a war against China. But the great masses of India have no interest in such a war. The U.S. plans to use them as a catspaw against China may yet boomerang and bring about the one thing the imperialists most hope to prevent: the socialist revolution in India.

#### Missionary Praises China After Five Years in Jail

Harold George King, a British missionary, was just released from a Chinese prison after serving four years and seven months of a five-year sentence.

He toured Shanghai before leaving China and said when he arrived in Hong Kong:

"From the material point of view, the Communists have done more for the people than any previous government in China."

This is important praise coming from an opponent of the regime. Naturally, Rev. King emphasized the "material," however. According to his standards, that is not the big-thing. "Man lives not by bread alone," as the preachers say, "but by things of the spirit, too."

But considering that the Chinese are carrying on a gigantic educational campaign (they have 90 million children in public school and are on the road to abolishing illiteracy and superstition altogether) the Chinese have also done more from the spiritual point of view than any previous Chinese government—and more than all the missionaries the imperialists have sent them for a hundred years.

#### What Did Really Kennedy Say?

John F. Kennedy's sudden conversion to the cause of civil rights—after two and a half years in office—has received the applause of Northern "liberals" and Southern "moderates" alike, as though he said just what they were thinking all the time.

But Kennedy's June 11 speech calling for full equal rights and first class cit-izenship for Afro-Americans was some-thing neither Kennedy's supporters nor Kennedy himself would have even imagined his making two short months

The militant part of Kennedy's speech was in fact nothing but a pale oratorical echo of the great mass actions of the Black masses of the South—in Birmingham and after.

True, the speech may herald some change in ruling class policy.

True, Kennedy flatly called for full equality and demanded legislation to enforce it. He even dared to mention—for the first time—that "the U.S. Constitution (should) be color blind."

But the most cursory reading of Kennedy's speech reveals that his main intention in making it—and in passing whatever legislation he can get passed and giving whatever concessions he has to give—is to stop the growing struggle of the black masses and divert that struggle into strictly legal channels.

In spite of all Kennedy's moralizing, he revealed again and again that his motive was fear—ruling class fear of an aroused Black people. If Birmingham was a turning point for the Afro-American people, it was also a loud alarm bell to the U.S. imperialist ruling class. For those who did not hear the alarm clearly enough, Kennedy repeated it in plain words and Boston accents:

"The fires of frustration are burning in every city, North and South. Where legal remedies are not at hand, redress is sought in demonstrations, parades and protests, which create tensions and threaten violence..."

#### Their Cops Club Weep for Evers' Death; Evers' Mourners

At the very time every newspaper in the U. S. — including in Mississippi—was weeping salt tears about Medgar Evers, the President and both of Mississippi's U.S. Senators were spouting their indignation against Evers' cowardly murderer, the Jackson police were showing the Afro-American people jost how seriously this was meant. On June 12, just a few hours after Evers was shot, the Black community of Jackson organized a protest parade. The police arrested 146 of the marchers. Rev. 



Even the ruling class is worried at the galloping increase in teen-age unemployement. Kennedy's Labor Secretary, Wirtz, has just said that it "could develop into to one of the most explosive social problems in the nation's history."

The number of young, "non-collegent bound" workers in the U.S. will increase by 4.5 million during this decade. One million youths (16-21 years) were unemployed in 1962. It is expected "if the parame unemployment rates prevail," that this number will swell to 1.4 million (youths (30 per cent of projected total unemployed workers) by 1967.

The average teen-age worker now has a 1 in 6 chance of being unemployed.

Afro-American youths are hit even than the chance of being unemployed.

To make maters worse, the number of unskilled jobs available to teenagers is decreasing: They are expected to drop to 4.6 per cent of total ylobs by 1970 from 5.5 per cent in 1960; machines run by fewer, more skilled workers will take over these jobs!

What does the Kennedy Administration propose as a solution to teen-age unemployment? A bill is now before Congress owhich would create a Youth Conservation; Corps to "provide useful training and form.—for a six-month to two-year petriod—for 15,000 men aged 16-21. The yegetation and wildlife.

The bill would also set up a Domestic The Deace Corps, employing 40,000 men and

women aged 16-21 to work toward improving urban living conditions. Both these projects would, together, employ only about 6.5 per cent of the unemployed youth.

Local projects of the same type, such as Mobilization for Youth and a proposed City Youth Corps in New York City are being "studied." These programs, both national and local, are not only incapable of solving the youth unemployment problem, but they represent a threat to wages for labor as a whole in that they propose to pay only subsistance wages to the youths.

Another avenue of approach is to increase vocational opportunities by improving the quality and increasing the scope of vocational education, and increasing the length of time spent in school. A Republican bill to triple federal aid to vocational education has passed the House Education and Labor Committee. Proposals have been made to raise the school drop-out age to 18 because the rate of drop-outs is increasing.

According to Louis F. Buckley of the According to Labor, jobs for which young people are inadequately trained are going begging on the labor market. Given an over-all national unemployment rate, "seasonally adjusted," of 5.9 per cent, it is difficult to see where all these jobs are hiding. Improved education would be a good thing, but it will not solve unemployment; and raising the school drop-out age will only delay a young person's job hunt by a couple of years.

The measures that will really help youth are not any of those that have been proposed by the representatives of the U.S. ruling class. Only the American workers can propose, and through struggle achieve, the solutions to these problems. But a rich kid doesn't have to contribute to his parents' support and if he gets married, he doesn't have to leave school. The money rolls in anyway, thad if a baby is born, the whole family goes to school without any trouble.

Of course, a large number of students drop out because of bad grades and because they lack a clear perspective and can't figure out how their restudies will benefit them. Here again, showever, the rich student, no matter yhow bad his grades, manages to stay in school. He is pushed ahead, goes to special schools, and if necessary, his gradianily buys him good grades.

"Don't Be a Drop-Out" is good advice, the stay it goes.

"Don't quit school before you learn

"Don't quit school before you learn a good trade or profession. Don't join the 800,000 teen-agers out of a job this spring — or the 3,000,000 looking for work this summer." So say the magazines and the wise editorials in the

newspapers.

To read this solemn and valuable advice, anybody would think that hundled the school through laziness, impatience to get married or sheer dumbness.

All you have to do is tighten up your discipline, put your shoulder to the wheel, put your nose to the grindstone, study a little harder and you, too, will be a moon rocket engineer at \$10,000 per year. At least that's the general idea conveyed by the anti-drop-out propagandists.

But the ad writers and faculty counselors leave out a point. They forget to mention that the "drop-outs" are all poor kids. The middle class and rich students just about never drop out of school. But hundreds of thousands of poor ones do every year.

SAIGON, June 16—Using tanks and barbed wire, bayonets, shotguns and machine guns — all supplied by the United States—the puppet troops of South Vietnam broke up a Buddhist idemonstration here today.

The "demonstration" consisted only in the attempt of the Buddhist masses to join the funeral procession of a Buddhist monk who had killed himself in protest against the regime's persecution of his religion.

### South Vietnam Challenges Times On U.S. Atrocities **Bertrand Russell**

When Reverend Quang Duc burned himself alive before the masses of this city, he was expressing not only a religious protest, but also the deep hatred of the popular masses against the Diem regime.

The Buddhist uprisings in Vietnam are a continuation of the civil war in another form. A liberation army is not possible inside Saigon at this moment; so political opposition is translated into religious opposition.

Ngo Dinh Diem and his henchmen are Roman Catholics. They represent only

However, the Times deleted certain relevant sections of Russell's second letter. In a recent letter to a peace group in this country, Russell gives the main section of his letter which the Times refused to publish. The following is that unpublished section.

In your fifth paragraph (the editorial attack) you also endeavor to minimize the effect of "defoliation chemicals" by calling them "common weed killers." If sprayed, as they must be to achieve the end for which you say they are intended, certain common weed killers would destroy many crops and animals. But, in fact, chemicals other than common weed killers have been used some of these were once used as "common weed killers," but were found to be too dangerous).

The U.S. Government has been charged by the south Vietnam Liberation Red Cross, after a year's study by them of the chemicals sprayed in south Vietnam and their effect upon the health of human beings, animals and crops, with

using weed killers which, in the large doses used, are harmful; with using white arsenic, various kinds of arsenite sodium and arsenite calcium, lead manganes arsenates, D.N.P. and D.N.C. (which inflame and eat into human flesh), and calcic cyanamide (which has "caused leaves, flowers and fruit to fall, killed big cattle like buffaloes and cows, and seriously affected thousands" of the inhabitants of south Vietnam); with having spread these poisonous chemicals on large and densely populated areas of south Vietnam.

Admittedly, the south Vietnam Liberation Red Cross is, as its name suggests, allied with those opposing the U.S.-supported Diem regime, but its published findings cannot be ignored since it has urged international investigation of the situation. The use of these weapons, napalm bombs and chemicals, constitutes and results in atrocities, and points to the fact that this is "a war of annihilation." Bertrand Russell, the well-known British pacifist, wrote a letter to the New York Times (April 8) protesting the U.S. war of annihilation in South Vietnam. He listed some of the U.S. atrocities, such as the use of napalm and chemicals to destroy crops and livestock. In the same issue of the Times, an editorial attempted to refute Russell's charge and defend the U.S. role in Vietnam. Russell then wrote a second letter to the Times in which he elaborated more fully on the U.S. atrocities, and also revealed the sources and details of his information.

Culture Goes to China's Peasants See the

Once upon a time there was a country where the poor peasants, were too tired at the end of the day to talk or sing, where they never saw any plays or movies, where only the sun and rain were heeded because human life was so precariously dependent upon them.

Today that country is a different land. Today the peasants still work hard, but they laugh and sing. They see traveling operas, hear music and even the people in the farthest and most inaccessible places see movies.

A fairy tale? No.

The Chinese Communist Party sends mobile cinema teams to take movies to the people. The teams consist of three most rugged countryside using pushcarts where there are roads or carrying their equipment on their backs in the mountains.

The peasants enjoy the movies so much that the teams, although weary from travel, find their work richly rewarding.

The films are often about scientific and agricultural subjects teaching the people how to improve on old-fashioned methods of farming and animal husbandry.

There are films about the revolution, such as The Long March and the Red Guards of Lake Hunghu. Operas are put on film, too. A great favorite is—Monkey Sun Fights the White-Bone Ghost.

But moving pictures are only a small, though important, part of the cultural transformation of the Chinese countryside. The great literacy campaigns are now bearing fruit. Nearly all young people have become voracious readers. For older people who know very few characters there are bright picture books. The radio, too, has penetrated the hinterland for the first time. Tens of thousands—soon-to-be millions—of sets are in the farm-houses.
